If you are the "Table Topics Master" at a Toastmasters Meeting

Prior to the Meeting

Your "topics" should tie in with the theme shown on the schedule.

The questions/topics should be ones which each member will be able to answer easily. The intent of the Table Topics is not to stump people, but rather to allow them to respond to your question confidently and easily.

During the Meeting

Review the agenda, and look around the room to check off members who are not scheduled for any tasks. These are the people you should probably ask to present a Table Topic. Know whom you are going to ask before you take control of the meeting.

When called upon by the Chairperson, approach the front of the room and shake the Chairperson's hand.

Outline the meaning of Table Topics to refresh members' knowledge and also to ensure that guests or new members understand the purpose. Table Topics provides the opportunity for members who are not scheduled to speak to participate in the meeting and also to get people to learn to "think and speak on their feet". Provide the times to the timer (1 minute on green, 1.5 minutes on amber and 2 minutes on red.)

Present your question/topic, you may need to prepare a brief introduction if an explanation or background is required. Be enthusiastic but brief.

When selecting someone, try to select a member who does not have a role in the meeting that day.

Always lead the applause when welcoming the speaker, and make a few brief comments at the conclusion of each table topic. Do not evaluate the table topics.

Depending on the schedule you may have only one or two topics if two speakers are scheduled, or more topics if only one speaker is scheduled. Come prepared with at least four table topics questions even though time may only permit one or two.

Upon completion of the session return the meeting back to the Chairperson by shaking Chairperson's hand.
