- 5. One Competent Leader (CL), Advanced Leader Bronze (ALB), Advanced Leader Silver (ALS), or Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM)
- 7. Four new members
- 8. Four more new members
- 9. Minimum of four club officers trained during each of two training periods 10. One membership dues renewal report and one club officer list submitted on time

Scott Hounsell is the Director of Construction Operations for Fluor Canada Ltd. He began his career at Fluor 15 years ago as a Mechanical Engineer. From there Scott progressed to become a Construction Engineer, a Construction Engineering Manager on several major projects, the Construction Engineering Department Manager and finally to the position he holds today. Since joining Fluor Communicators, Scott has been a very active member of the club. He has held multiple positions on the club executive including

Sergeant at Arms, Secretary and Club Contest Chair. Fluor TM News Flash takes a minute to ask Scott some questions about Toastmasters and other interests.

1. When did you join Fluor Communicators?

I joined Fluor Communicators in Sept of 2009.

2. What encouraged you to enrol in Toastmasters?

I had never been a confident speaker in front of a crowd. This 'fear of presenting' started in junior high during mandatory 'public speaking' competitions. I was a few years into my career with Fluor when I first had the opportunity to present at a conference in Houston. The 'fear of speaking' came rushing back nearly paralysing me during the presentation, it was not a good feeling and I knew something had to be done. I realized that while my most favourite subjects (i.e. math and the sciences) paved the road to attaining my engineering degree, it was my least favourite subjects (i.e. writing and presenting) that would pave the way into a Leadership position. I started to research various means of improving both my writing/presentation abilities and Toastmasters was one of the means I selected. Being in the field and working 50+ hour weeks, made it difficult for me to find the time to commit. Once I was settled back into the office environment, after 11 years on various construction sites, I joined Fluor Communicators.

3. What benefits did you gain from Toastmasters? How have they helped you in your personal life and career?

Has Toastmasters helped in my personal life and my career, absolutely YES!! While I have not yet achieved a Competent Communicator designation I have already started to reap the benefits of Toastmasters. Just this March I was given the opportunity to present at a conference here in Calgary and what a difference. I was completely surprised to find that my 'fear of speaking' had turned from a paralysing roar to tiny whisper. Toastmasters had a major positive impact on my confidence, composure and speaking clarity. I still have much to improve but I know that Fluor Communicators will be there to support me as I continue to strengthen my presentation skills.

4. What are the challenges you face as a Toastmaster?

Primarily time management, however this is also another positive learning opportunity that Toastmasters provides to its members. Besides working towards your "Competent Communicator" designation, Toastmasters also has a stream where you can achieve a "Competent Leadership" designation. This stream affords you the opportunity to plan & manage meetings as well as learn to provide quality feedback to club members. Practicing these skills now has a direct positive impact on your ability to plan & lead meetings at work as well as improving your ability to provide quality feedback in the form of Performance Assessments and ongoing coaching/mentoring as you move towards varying lead roles within Fluor.

5. What do you enjoy doing in your spare time? .i.e. favourite sport, music, etc? Why?

I have too many half-started hobbies to mention but primarily I am starting to re-focus on playing guitar. Learning how to play the guitar was my escape from the stresses of studying in University and I have always found it relaxing and enjoyable. As my career started to develop my work life balance went askew and I stopped playing for some time. Recently as I have begun to find my balance I have also rediscovered my interest in playing guitar and bought a beautiful 12-string acoustic. Beyond playing guitar, I enjoy cooking on weekends and an occasional afternoon at the shooting range.

6. What message would you give to new Toastmasters or people who are considering becoming Toastmasters?

I would encourage people to stop thinking about it and join. Drop by for a visit on any Tuesday meeting and you will see how Toastmasters promotes learning in a safe, positive and encouraging environment.

The Competent Leadership Program

The Toastmasters educational program consists of two tracks: a communication track and a leadership track. You are encouraged to participate in both tracks. The two tracks are not mutually exclusive, and you can work in both at the same time.

The *Competent Leadership* manual is the core of the leadership track. It features 10 projects, which you complete while serving in various club meeting roles. Each of the ten projects in the *Competent Leadership* manual focuses on a different leadership skill, providing you background information and an assignment that requires your serving in one or more specified meeting or club roles in which you can practice aspects of that skill. Roles can include Evaluator, Timer, Toastmaster, Ah-Counter and General Evaluator.

You need to fulfill each typical meeting role at least once. Roles such as General Evaluator or Toastmaster need to be performed multiple times. Doing the same role counts for credit only once per project per meeting. As an essential part of the Toastmasters program, another Toastmaster will provide you written and/or verbal feedback on each leadership project completed. The evaluator provides a personal opinion of your leadership role, pointing out strengths and offering suggestions for improvement.

The *Competent Leadership* manual provides a Project Matrix (at the end of the manual) to help in keeping track of club roles to be fulfilled. Important to keep in mind is the fact that even though each project in the CL manual lists three to five roles, the number of roles required to complete the project is less than that listed in the Matrix.

When you complete the manual, you are eligible for Competent Leader (CL) recognition. You'll receive a CL certificate and, if you wish, Toastmasters World Headquarters will send your employer a letter about your accomplishment.

The *Competent Leadership* Program encourages you to complete roles that might be outside of your comfort zone, but these roles are definitely beneficial to developing stronger leadership skills!
