THE MULTIPLIER EFFECT – ANTHONY SANNI - DTM



Warren Buffet is one of the greatest investors of all time, having made billions of dollars over the course of his career. His uncanny, almost mystical ability to identify promising and often underpriced investments has made him an icon in the world of finance. Yet when the Oracle of Omaha—as he is reverently called—was asked what was his best investment ever, he pointed to a course he took in college that cost only about \$100. It was a public-speaking course.

As a persuasive public-speaking coach, I can confirm.

Public-speaking is one of the greatest enhancers of any skill you possess. Given *any* set of abilities you already have, your ability to speak skillfully to any number of people will multiply the power you have, and the impact you make. Like I always tell my clients: Public-speaking gives you the power to communicate your ideas. To more people. On your terms.

You know what else I tell my clients? Join Toastmasters.

PUBLIC-SPEAKING: A KEY MULTIPLIER

I first attended Toastmasters when I was in grad school after a friend invited me to a university student club. After that first meeting—hearing the educational and inspirational speeches, meeting smart, supportive and fascinating people, and just plain having a ton of fun—I could tell this was a valuable, underpriced investment. And so, I joined and got engaged.

A few weeks after, I had an important presentation to give in an advanced course on the philosophy of mind and cognition. It was about as exciting as it sounds. Yet, with the skills I had learned, practicing how to synthesize and present ideas in an engaging way in Toastmasters, I was able to ace the presentation.

It was an amazing feeling having the professor—a skilled communicator himself—and fellow students come up to me afterward and say how much they enjoyed my talk. Public-speaking had *multiplied* the returns on the investment in studying my coursework. So, I kept with it because I suspected it could do the same for other aspects of my life. And it has.


PUBLIC SPEAKING: A CRITICAL PIECE OF MY VITAL FEW

The 80/20 Principle says that 80% of our results come from 20% of inputs. For example, we wear about 20% of our clothes 80% of the time. And most businesses owe about 80% of their profits to about 20% of their products or clients. This 80/20 label is ok, but I prefer the name I chose for my book—The Law of The Vital Few.

IN THE BOOK, I talk about how only a Vital Few factors produce most of the results in our lives. Knowing this, the thing to do is plain: Find those Vital Few that produce the results you want. Get better at them. And do more of them.

For me, and perhaps for you as well, one of the Vital Few was public-speaking. It has been an enhancer not only of every job I have ever had, but also of my coaching, professional speaking (duh!), and writing.

Now, you may or may not want to "go pro" with your speaking. But I am sure you are interested in becoming a better speaker nonetheless and reaping the many fruits of this powerful skill. If so, let me offer my Vital Few tips to help you nail your next presentation.



THE MULTIPLIERS OF EFFECTIVE PUBLIC-SPEAKING

Like any other skill, mastering public-speaking takes time, effort and practice. But these Vital Few tips will boost your outputs regardless of your current skill level.

- 1. Clarify your main goal: Everything else depends on this. Without it, you can't make good choices. Toastmasters presents roughly four potential speaking goals: informing, entertaining, inspiring and persuading. Often you will have a mix. But being clear on your main goal will help you choose everything from your content to your delivery style. Thankfully, there are projects in the Toastmasters program that address each of these, so take advantage of them.
- Know your audience: I can't stress this one enough. Your speech is by you, but it is not for
 you. Get to know what your audience wants, needs, and cares about. Then tailor your
 content and delivery to match. This alone will multiply your effectiveness, even if it is the
 only change you make.
- 3. **Rehearse until you are sick of it:** My first Toastmasters mentor once told me that you will always have three speeches for every one speech—the speech you planned to give, the speech you gave, and the speech you wish you gave. The best way to close the gap between the three is to take preparation and rehearsal seriously.

YOUR BEST INVESTMENT (?)

I can't tell you that getting better at public-speaking will be the best investment you *ever* make. I certainly can't tell you it will help you make billions of dollars like Warren Buffet. But I *can* confidently say that if you are looking for a steeply underpriced investment to multiply the output of all your other personal and professional efforts, a Toastmasters membership is a hard deal to beat.


